What Should LRSTs Do?




- Work together to improve runway safety
- Local issues Local fixes
- Informing each other, other users and RSG of any issues or fixes
- Raise issues that can't be addressed locally to RSG



Participation



- Aerodrome operator
- Airlines or aircraft operators
- Aviation Rescue and Fire Fighting (ARFF)
- Pilot associations
- ATC
- Any other group with a direct involvement in runway operations

Tips



- Aerodromes are best suited to take ownership of LRST implementation
- Most people on airports are very busy and effective participation in the LRST may be difficult.
 - Consider 'mandating' the meeting and attendance, rather relying on 'encouragement'
 - Although not preferred, adding the LRST to an existing meeting may lead to better participation
 - Active participation by regular attendees will provide better outcomes
- Ensure issues and/or minutes of the meeting are provided to the nominated RSG representative.
