THE WILDLIFE HAZARD ASSESSMENT PROVIDES THE BASIS FOR DEVELOPMENT OF THE WILDLIFE HAZARD MANAGEMENT PLAN

139.337 (f) Plan shall include at least the following:

- 1. Authorities and responsibilities
- 2. WHA actions target dates for initiation and completion
- 3. Wildlife hazard management procedures
- 4. Habitat management
- 5. Permits (local, state, and federal)
- 6. Resources
- 7. Training
- 8. WHMP review / evaluation





INTERAGENCY COORDINATION

Agency and Local Government Coordination

- MUST coordinate between FAA and other Federal Agencies
- ➤ Meet with local field offices-FWS, USACE, EPA
 - Coordinate with Airport Inspector and Regional Office
- Coordination with County Office of Planning and Development







INTERAGENCY COORDINATION

-When Missions Conflict-

FACT: There will almost always be a conflict between FAA and other agencies with regard to wildlife.

Example: Managing habitat on airport property to provide for populations of T&E species.

- Must evaluate on case-by-case basis
- Must collect all valid information (is it going to directly or indirectly increase wildlife hazards to aircraft?)
- Public safety trumps managing for wildlife populations on airports





INTERAGENCY COORDINATION -When Missions Conflict-

FACT: There will almost always be a conflict between FAA and other agencies with regard to wildlife.

•Refer to Advisory Circular 150/5200-33 Hazardous Attractants to Wildlife On or Near Airports
