




RECOMMENDED PRACTICES ON TRANSPARENCY AND CONSULTATIONS WITH AIRLINES ON SETTING AIRPORT CHARGES



Airports have become businesses in their own right. In an increasingly competitive environment which drives airports to sophisticate their services to the airlines and their end-users, the passengers, it is essential to build the right trust between airports and airlines, by ensuring the right level of transparency and that consultations This document is meant to provide recommendations are carried out in setting charges and capital planning in a structured and meaningful way.

Adequate airport infrastructure is a core enabler of air limitation or constraint for airport operators and/or States connectivity, passenger service quality and social and to apply their own methodologies when circumstances, economic growth. Caveats

- Aspirational not prescriptive guidelines
- Light-touched, proportionate regulation
- Consultation and negotiation are not synonym
- Reciprocity is a key enabler for success



Consultation (1/3): Timeline

- Clear timeline
- Circulation of supporting documentation
- Proposal ahead of change in charges
- Information on service levels where SLAs are in place



Consultation (2/3): Eligibility

- Constructive engagement of all airlines
- Association of airlines (AOC, BAR, IATA, etc.)
 with a mandate to act on behalf of and on
 account on the specific airline(s) they
 represent
- Consultation in national language or English
- Different views recorded in the minutes



Consultation (3/3): Appeal

- Coherent, evidence-based
- Airlines participating to the meeting, with power of attorney/mandate
- Association of airlines same condition: specify airlines represented, and mandate
- Clear timeframe



Transparency (1/3): General

- Degree of transparency proportionate to the market power and the market situation of the airport.
- Transparency applies equally to both airport operators and users – both committed to provide relevant information



Transparency (2/3): Information

• Airlines:

Traffic forecast, fleet composition, operational plans, and needs & requirements

Airport operators:

- General elements: facilities covered by charges, till model
- Traffic: historic, forecasts
- Operating costs: figures for key categories, drivers for cost changes
- Capital costs: depreciation, and WACC & RAB if applicable and relevant
- Revenue: aeronautical revenue, and commercial revenue shared in the aeronautical till when relevant
- Relevant performance indicators



Airport systems & networks

 Overall costs and breakdown of aeronautical revenues for the main airport, as required by relevant legislative frameworks and local circumstances



Capital expenditure

Largest capex for new facilities
