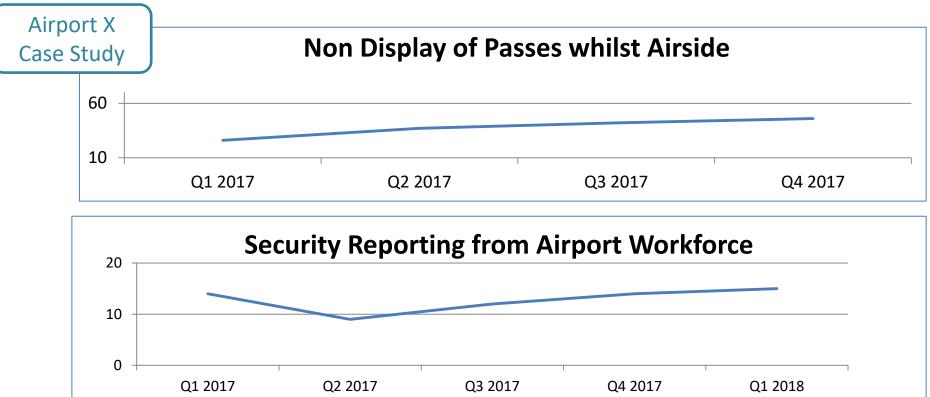
#### Problem

# Factors inhibiting good security behaviours surrounding Lack of vigilance

"If I do see something I don't know who or how to report it"

Lack of time to think 'security' – everyone is busy in their role. Lack of knowledge / communications

Current Lack of Education on Threat & Training

Those in non security role – "Isn't this why we have security/police personnel?"

# **Intervention – Introduction of Airport X Security Policy**

#### AVIATION SECURITY POLICY

The primary objective of Airport X is to assure the protection and safety of passengers, crew, ground personnel, third parties based at the airport, the general public, aircraft and facilities serving civil aviation, againstacts of unlawful xxxxxxxx

Responsibility for implementing the aviation security policy rests with all persons who work at Airport X. In addition, the Accountable Manager (Chief Operations Director) has the following specific commitments to:

- A) A continuous improvement programme which consistently monitors and reviews security performance;
- Provide appropriate resources, assign clear responsibilities within the security team and ensure adequate training is provided;
- Enforce security awareness as the responsibility of all personnel within Airport X;
- D) Include Security reporting procedures and whistleblowing armagements;
- E) Promote a positive security culture

The Accountable Manager will endorse this policy and shall;

- A) Identify security as a high organisational priority mutually supportive of commercial and operational priorities;
- B) Reflect organisational commitments regarding security;
- C) Be communicated, with visible endorsement, throughout the Airport;
- D) Be periodically reviewed to ensure it remains relevant and appropriate to Airport x.

Who?	Embedding Behaviour (5 E's)
All Airport Workers	ENDORSE Security Manager (working closely with COO) writes the policy which is signed at bottom by COO.
	EDUCATE  The Policy clearly articulates what the COO is committing to, the objective of the policy, how the policy will be met (and crucially the message that responsibility for implementing the policy rests with all persons working at Airport X)
	ENABLE Whilst the policy doesn't define behaviours required of Airport Workers it clearly states the Airport's commitment (through sufficient security training and communications) and instils an understanding that everyone should be playing their part towards security at the airport.
	ENCOURAGE The Policy educates workers that the policy can only be successful if all workers play their part in contributing to security. Visibility of the Policy through display across the airport will remind workers of the Airport's commitment & the role they need to play for the policy to be effective.
	EVALUATE  After 3 months in situ conduct interviews with workers to check understanding / awareness of the policy? Has their been any increase in reports?/reduction in breaches?
