INTERPOL in Brief

- Global law enforcement cooperation organization
- Headquartered in Lyon, France with regional representation
- 194 member countries, each with an INTERPOL National Central Bureau
- Mandate: "To ensure and promote the widest possible mutual assistance between all criminal police authorities within the limits of the laws existing in the different countries"







Role of Law Enforcement & INTERPOL in UNSCR 2341

National Law Enforcement

- UNSC calls upon <u>Member States</u> to:
 - ✓ OP2: assess relevant risks
 - ✓ OP2: take preparedness measures
 - ✓ OP2: ensure effective responses to attacks
 - OP3: establish terrorist acts as serious criminal offenses
 - OP4: exchange information on prevention, protection, mitigation, preparedness, investigation, response and recovery to attacks


- UNSC calls upon <u>international organizations</u> to:
 - OP7: identify shared good practices/measures to manage risk
 - ✓ OP11: facilitate technical assistance, raise awareness
 - ✓ OP12: continue facilitation and assistance on capacity building on 2341 measures







INTERPOL Support to UNSCR 2341



- Increase exchange of police data on terrorist use of drones and incidents of terrorists targeting CI
- Develop analytical capacity internally in order to produce analytical products for Member Countries
- Build capacity in national law enforcement to protect CI against terrorist attacks
- Support national strategy development on protection of CI against terrorist attacks, with law enforcement as a key stakeholder







Definition of Critical Infrastructure (CI)


2341 Preamble:
