
CHICAGO CONVENTION

Preamble

THEREFORE, the undersigned governments having agreed on certain principles and arrangements in order that international civil aviation may be developed in a safe and orderly manner and that international air transport services may be established on the basis of equality of opportunity and operated soundly and economically;



Regulatory Framework

- A38-14: Consolidated statement of continuing ICAO policies in the air transport field
- APPENDIX A: Economic regulation of international air transport
- The Assembly:
- 8. Urges Member States to give due regard to the distinct features of air cargo services when exchanging market access rights in the framework of air service agreements and grant appropriate rights and operational flexibility so as to promote the development of these services
- 14. Requests the Council to develop a specific international agreement to facilitate further liberalization of air cargo services, taking into account past achievements, States' views on existing arrangements and suggestions made during ATConf/6;
- 15. Requests the Council to continue to cooperate with regional and sub regional bodies in their examination and development of measures of cooperation, including liberalized arrangements, and the results of these measures, in order to see whether similar or other measures should at the appropriate time be recommended to Member States for application on a wider basis;

Regulatory Framework

- A38-16: Consolidated statement of continuing policies related to facilitation
- The Assembly:
- 3. Requests the Council to ensure that Annex 9 Facilitation, is current and addresses the contemporary requirements of Member States with respect to administration of border controls, cargo and passengers; advances in technologies related to such administration; cargo facilitation;
- 8. Urges Member States to call upon international operators and their associations to participate to the extent possible in electronic data interchange systems in order to achieve maximum efficiency levels in the processing of passenger and cargo traffic at international terminals;
- 10. Urges States and operators, in cooperation with interested international organizations, to make all possible efforts to speed up the handling and clearance of air cargo, while ensuring the security of the international supply chain; and
- 11. Urges Member States to undertake dialogue and cooperation between national and regional facilitation and security-related bodies




<u>United Nations:</u> "Sustainable development meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs."

The three dimensions of sustainability



World trade focused on bulk commodities






Total world air cargo revenue






Air share of trade on major trade lines Air cargo and containerships

Percentage of kg transported by air vs sea







freight tonne-km (million)








Freight Tonne-Kilometres



Freight Traffic: Worldwide Distribution


Distribution in Freight Tonne-Kilometres








Long-term Air Traffic Forecasts: "GATO" Scheduled Freight Traffic





Chinese carriers performed 8,6% of the world air freight traffic in 2013





(million)



Definition of Connectivity in Air Transport

Movement of passengers, mail and cargo involving the minimum of transit points

- which makes trip as short as possible
- with optimal user satisfaction
- at the **minimum** price possible




Connectivity Components

In order to optimize connectivity a strong supporting <u>framework</u> is needed

This includes:

- market access (e.g. liberalization)
- optimal use of:
 - air navigations services (incl. ASBUs)
 - Aircraft
 - airport systems
 - facilitation and security
- intermodality
- airline activities







ICAO AND TIACA TO STRENGTHEN COOPERATION

Dallas/Fort Worth (18 April 2013): The International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) and The International Air Cargo Association (TIACA) signed a Declaration of Intent today to strengthen co-operation on technical matters.

The declaration was officially signed in Dallas at TMCA's 2013 Executive Summit by the Association's Chairman, Michael Steen, and by ICAO's Secretary General, Raymond Benjamin.

Under the terms of the new agreement, ICAO and TIACA will work more closely on air cargo and mail security and facilitation, accelerating the evolution from paper-based to electronic processes, environmental stewardship, the liberalization of market access air cargo services, and air cargo settless, and air cargo settless.

ICAD and TIACA have agreed to 'consult, confer and cooperate on a confirmous basis, over an above attendance at formal meet. They will keep each other informed of project activities and programs of work in the areas identified in the Declaration of Intent.

TRACA, which is already on the list of international organizations that may be invited to attend suitable ICAO meetings, has agreed to desaminate information on elevant ICAO standards and recommended practices, policies and technical guidance materials, and be promote implementation by the membrant policy.

Each of the parties will also invite the other to be represented by observers at global and regional conferences or meetings relating to the areas of cooperation.

This new commitment by ICAO and TIACA follows a joint communique for "Enhanced Cooperation in the Field of Air Cargo Transportation" last October, which was issued at TIACA's 28th International Air Cargo Forum & Exposition in Atlanta, Georgia.
