

Ensure sharing of best practices and applied expertise on a global basis


AMPAP – Objectives

- The sharing of airport management bestpractices
- The promotion of Airport Management as a PROFESSION

AMPAP Requirements

- 6 one-week courses (or online equivalent)
 - 4 mandatory courses
 - > 1 course <u>face-to-face</u> delivery
 - ➤ Air Transport System, mandatory entry course
 - > 3 online courses
 - > Airport Commercial and Financial Management
 - > Airport Operations, Safety and Security
 - Airport Master Planning, Development and Environmental Management
 - 2 electives offered by ACI and/or ICAO
